In the name of God Amen; I John Comly of Eorsham in the County of Dorset
 of Chyrill Anno Dni 1637. I John Comly of Eorsham in the County of Dorset
 of Sara being weak in body but of perfect memory feeleth he unto God dolefully
 make my last will and Testament: first I commend my soule into the hande of almighty
 God my maker and redeemer trustinge through the merite of his deate and bitter
 passion of my lord and Saviour Iesus Christ to have free remission and pardon of
 all my sinnes And my body I commend unto the earth from whence it came to be buried in
 the churchyard of Eorsham As concerning my worldly goods I bequeath as followeth First
 I give and bequeath unto my sonne John Comly my best bedstead and table board and
 forme one livery chestbord and one chest bedmy all in the Chamber next to my house and
 also ten pounde current English money part of two hundred pounde; my will is that he
 shall have my sonne John to a trade; and the remainder to be payed when he shall attaine to
 the age of twenty one years; Item I give and bequeath to my eldest daughter our
 Elizabeth my biggest chest to be delivered after my decease Item I give to the said
 Elizabeth and her husband and my biggest bed to be delivered immediately after my decease
 of my wife thirty pounde of current money to be payed when shee shall attaine to the
 age of twenty one year or at the day of her marriage yf she be not troublesome to her
 mother; Item I give unto my daughter Mary one chest to be delivered after my
 decease; Also I give to the said Mary one chest and one brass pott after the decease
 of my wife and ten pounde of current money to be payed when shee shall attaine to the
 age of twenty one year or at the day of her marriage yf she be not troublesome to her mother
 Item I give to my daughter Robert one chest to be delivered after my decease and one
 chest and one brass pott to be delivered after the decease of my wife and ten pounde
 of money when shee shall attaine to the age of twenty one year or at the day of her
 marriage yf shee be not troublesome to her mother Item I give to my daughter
 Elizabeth my warmmye gown after the decease of my wife Item all the rest of my goods
 as well moveable as immoveable and not hereby bequeathed I give and bequeath to
 Mary my wife whom I make my sole executrix of this my last will to see my debts
 and legacies payed and my funerall expences discharged. My will is that if any
 of my said children happen to dye before they attaine to the age aforesaid then their
 legacies bequeathed to them appoynted to the best of my children livinge for my owne part
 ordaine and appoynt Simon Croker clerke and John Durke to see this my will performed
 and for their paines to be taken therein I give to each of them half a crown a year
 buy out of them a year of gloves In witness whereof I have subscribed this my last
 will the day and year above written the mark of John Comly sealed and
 delivered in the presence of the said Simon Croker and John Durke. Meo notari pub.

Memorandum that Sir Lewis Mansell
late of Margan in the County of Glamorgan Knight and Baronet being of perfect
mind and memory with an intent to make his last will and Testament did on the twentieth day
of March Anno Domini 1638 or thereabouts make and declare his last will and Testament
in manner and form following or to the like effect vizt first he did name
and constitute and ordain his dear and loving wife the Lady Elizabeth Mansell his sole
and whole executrix of all his goods Chattels lands and estate real personal and
after that he did give and bequeath unto his daughter Jane Mansell the sum of ten thousand
pounds of good and lawfull money of England but upon condition that said Anne Morgan
his Aunt should deliver unto his executrix the bond of five thousand pounds now by her
held for the payment of two thousand five hundred pounds to or for his said daughter
And further willed that for the said bond he should be paid unto her for her maintenance
until that she was provided for. And he did also give unto his daughter Elizabeth
Mansell and Mary Mansell five thousand pounds between them And he gave to his son
Edward Mansell five thousand pounds And also he gave unto Blanche his wife
Mansell his daughter one hundred pounds w^{ch} Baronet Mansell did owe unto
him And he did give unto his son Henry Mansell a Diamond w^{ch} was his fathers
And to his wife Anne Morgan twenty pounds And to his wife Jane Mansell twenty
pounds he did give also to the poor of Margan and to the poor of Margan
as his father did in his last will And a note being brought unto him by his own
invention of the names of his servants he did give unto them the legacies following
and did write the same with his own hand as followeth vizt to Edward
Williams ten pounds life To James Jones twenty pounds To Hugh Roberts
five pounds To George Fleming forty shillings To Francis Roberts forty shillings
To Philip Jones forty shillings To Edward Jones five pounds To Thomas Howie forty
shillings To William Durris forty shillings To Peilly Jones four pounds To
David Gambourlain forty shillings To Edward Harrant forty shillings To Mathew
Duffe four pounds To Richard Barton five pounds To William Gibbon forty
shillings To Edward Thomas forty shillings To Howell Jenkin five pounds To Stephen
Rogers forty shillings To William Jones forty shillings To Richard Rowell
forty shillings To Nicholas Taylor twenty shillings To John the Barber four
shillings To John of the Stable twenty shillings To Thomas Lewis five pounds
and to Thomas Bunfoot forty pounds in the presence of Hearing
of Francis Davis Charles James Jenkins and others.
